THE TRUTH ABOUT BRAZIL

A Letter to the New York Times Denies Reports of an Impending Uprising Against the Vargas Government in That Country

A LETTER in the New York Times, November 2, from a writer signing himself as Director of the Brazil Information Service, New York City, states that news of impending revolutionary activities in São Paulo and Rio Grande do Sul which the Times published under a Buenos Aires date line recently was colored, no doubt unintentionally, by the fact that "all of the opponents of Vargas's government are living there." Had the Times correspondent been in Rio and not in Buenos Aires, says the writer, he would have been informed differently. The recently elected Constitutional Assembly will meet to choose a new President on November 15, and everybody knows that the election of the Constitutional Assembly was a true and free election, representing the will of the people.

"Here are the facts about Armando Salles de Oliveira, the present interventor of São Paulo," continues the letter, "He went to Rio to solve the complicated case of the coffee growers. There is an investigation going on about the bootleg exchange. Mr. Oliveira, to rid the government of the direct hatred originated by the coffee element involved, asked the Vargas government to appoint General Daltro to head the investigation, independently of the State interventor.

"The talk of separation of São Paulo from Brazil is spread by the bankers who lent the money guaranteed by coffee. The only payment of debts actually made by Brazil are the ones guaranteed by coffee. The Vargas government is trying to solve the problem of Brazil in general, without preference for São Paulo or any other State. No Brazilian thinks of separating São Paulo. Brazil has been
