### COFFEE MARKET REVIEW

Much Activity During February on the New York Coffee Exchange, But Prices Drop Compared with Preceding Month

THE activity of the previous month on the New York Coffee and Sugar Exchange decreased during February. Likewise, the advances in quotations in January were not repeated in February, the month ending in recessions in both the Santos and the Rio contracts.

Santos 4s, closing at the end of January at 8.959.34, dropped during February to 8.56-8.68, bavenig a loss of 39 to 45 points. Rio 7s dropped from
5.26-5.78 to 4.80-5.30, or 46 to 48 points; while
spots declined from 8½c.-9½c. to 8½c.-9½c., or a
loss of ½c.

Following the recent period of larger deliveries and advanced quotations, speculation on both the immediate and distant future increased and longs

and shorts had frequent opportunity to match wits. Deliveries continued unabated and large roaster interests were active in both spot and futures market. Exchange conditions and other news from Brazil had their usual effect upon New York trading. Fear of lack of quality supplies and a sufficiency of the lower grades induced around a 350 point spread between the two, or a hundred above normal. This disparity was eased somewhat by the report of early buying (of lower grades) by the Departamento Nacional do Café (DNC). From Colombia came disquieting news of impossibility of immediate delivery of Magdalena shipped coffees, due to hazards of navigation in that river. Accordingly, Colombians and other milds were in good demand. During the month notices were a disturbing factor, but these were readily absorbed without much disturbance, to a good extent, it is reported, by roaster interests.
